

## ORCID Workshop

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### GENERAL INFORMATION

- This will be a half-day workshop
- The primary presenter for the workshop will be Heath Marks
- The workshop will include a hands-on component
- The number of attendees will be constrained only by the venue capacity
- There are no technical requirements beyond AV and access to wireless network

### DESCRIPTION

This workshop provides an opportunity for institutions to engage with ORCID, the Open Researcher and Contributor Identifier. Heath Marks, who represents the Australian Access Federation on the Australian ORCID Working Group, and Laurel Haak, Executive Director of ORCID, are the two main presenters for the workshop.

ORCID is continuing to attract a high level of interest and enthusiasm in the Australian research sector, reflected in attendance at two national roundtables, the issuing of an ORCID Joint Statement of Principle endorsed by Universities Australia, the Australasian Research Management Society, the Council of Australian University Librarians and the Australian National Data Service. Australia's two major research funding agencies, the Australian Research Council and the National Health and Medical Research Council, have also issued a joint statement on ORCID and are looking to integrate it into their grant application systems.

To realise the benefits outlined in the statements, the ORCID working group (comprised of representatives from UA, CAUL, ARMS, ANDS, AAF and CAUDIT), have been working with the Universities Australia Deputy Vice Chancellor's Research group, the ARC, NHMRC and other publicly-funded research agencies to progress options for sector-wide adoption of ORCID. An Australian national consortium model with AAF as the lead institution has been developed to facilitate institutional adoption and rollout.

This workshop is designed to introduce participants to ORCID, allow them to explore and engage with the ORCID Australian national consortium model, and inform plans for ORCID rollout at their institution covering both technical and cultural change aspects. It is aimed at those interested in integrating ORCID at their institution and those thinking about or ready to join an ORCID Australian national consortium, including research managers, library managers, repository managers, office of research staff, library staff, technical support managers and staff, and eResearch staff.

#### 1. **An overview of ORCID: international and national update** (45 minutes)

This session will introduce attendees to ORCID, provide an update of ORCID growth and uptake internationally, and provide an overview of ORCID activities in Australia including the Joint Statement of Principle and the NHMRC and ARC Joint Statement on ORCID. A member of the ORCID Working Group (co-ordinators of the Joint Statements) will discuss the Group's work and the national consortium model developed for the Australian community to streamline ORCID integration, provide centralized support and increase uptake.

#### 2. **Exploring the ORCID Australian national consortium license** (60 minutes)

This session will explore in depth the Australian national consortium license including the model adopted and how institutions can engage and benefit as consortium members.

#### 3. **Rolling out ORCID at your institution** (60 minutes)

This session will look at examples of end-to-end ORCID rollout internationally in addition to reflecting on Australian experiences. It will cover the planning process at an institution, create-on-demand workflows, and lessons learned. It

will also refer to some neat resources. There will be a hands-on component and ORCID representatives will be on hand to answer questions.

#### 4. **Community and technical support through the consortium model** (30 minutes)

This final session will discuss how the community will be supported through the consortium model covering both technical and cultural change aspects of ORCID implementation.

### **WHO SHOULD ATTEND**

This workshop is aimed at those interested in integrating with ORCID at their institution including those thinking about or ready to join an ORCID Australian national consortium. This is likely to include: research managers, library managers, repository managers, office of research staff, library staff, technical support managers and staff, and eResearch staff.

**Heath Marks.** Heath Marks is the General Manager of the Australian Access Federation. ORCID's mission is to transform the research and development ecosystem by delivering the technical infrastructure and services to generate and manage persistent, and unique researcher identifiers for the benefit of all stakeholders. Laure is based in Washington DC, USA.

**Adrian Burton.** Dr. Adrian Burton is Director, Services, at the Australian National Data Service. ANDS is an organisation set up by the Australian Government to enhance the value of data for researchers, research institutions, and the nation as part of its wider National Collaborative Research Infrastructure Strategy. Adrian represents ANDS on the national ORCID Working Group.
